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Tri-County Health Department Teams With Rocky Mountain PBS to Promote “Unnatural Causes ... Is Inequality Making Us Sick?”

Tri-County Health Department and Rocky Mountain PBS have teamed up to promote the landmark television series *Unnatural Causes ... Is Inequality Making Us Sick?* The series will be broadcast throughout Colorado on Rocky Mountain PBS on four consecutive Thursdays, starting March 27, and running through April 17.

The program reveals that the U.S. is one of the richest countries on the planet, yet we rank 29th in the world for life expectancy – among the worst in the industrialized world – even lower than some poor countries like Costa Rica and Chile. We spend more than twice as much per person on health care than the average industrialized country spends, yet we live shorter, less healthy lives.

This four-hour series suggests that there is more to our ill health than bad habits or unlucky genes. The social environment in which we are born, live and work profoundly affects our well-being and longevity. Things we do not usually associate with health – good jobs, affordable housing, a clean environment and a good education – matter as much for health as efforts to get people to eat right, exercise more, and stop smoking. *Unnatural Causes* investigates many of these socioeconomic and racial inequities, which can lead to poor health.

Unnatural Causes will be broadcast on four consecutive Thursdays – March 27, April 3, April 10 and April 17. The hour-long episodes will air at 9 p.m. on Rocky Mountain PBS.
