

Flu and COVID-19 vaccine clinics open to walk-ins



Flu shots available to everyone 6 months and older. COVID-19 vaccines available to everyone 5 years and older. Individuals younger than 18 years of age require parent/legal guardian consent; a note or phone call is acceptable.

Clinics may close before the scheduled end time if capacity is reached.

When you get the COVID-19 vaccine

You're doing your part to help stop the pandemic. Vaccines are one of our best tools to protect our health and prevent disease.

You can be confident it's safe and it works. The COVID-19 vaccine will not give you the disease, but will help keep you from getting it.

You don't have to pay for it. The U.S. government is providing the vaccine free of charge to people living in the United States.

You may have side effects, but that's normal. If you experience flu-like symptoms, that's a sign your body is building protection against COVID-19.

It's still important to wear face covering and practice social distancing. Experts are learning more about how COVID-19 vaccination helps reduce spread of the disease, and will update community safety recommendations as they keep learning.

You have rights with the COVID-19 vaccine

- You don't have to pay for it. It's free for every person 12 and older living in the United States.
- You will never be billed for it.
- You don't have to have health insurance or a regular doctor to receive it.
- You don't have to provide documentation or personal information to receive it.
- You're entitled to receive information about it in your primary language.
- If you are not a U.S. citizen, receiving the vaccine won't jeopardize your immigration status.
- You are entitled to an Emergency Use Authorization fact sheet about the vaccine. It has specific information about the vaccine so you can make an informed decision about receiving it.
